Last week the Diocese held a conference for school leaders where we were blessed to hear Cardinal Timothy Radcliffe's reflections on the theme of "hope" and the legacy of the Jubilee Year which drew to a close last Friday. The Cardinal has, over decades of ministry, spent time all over the world and often in the most challenging of circumstances, mainly in various war-torn parts of the Middle East. He offered the provision of education as one of the greatest symbols of hope, as it has the power to transform the lives of young people, even when they start their journeys amidst the destruction of war. As we embark on the season of Advent next week, we are called to reflect on these blessings and enter into a period of quiet but joyful preparation and expectation for the coming of Our Lord. In an age where so many of us, not just youngsters, find it difficult to be still, we are encouraged to find the time and space to engage with the theme of hope and think about how we, through the example of our own lives, can spread that sense of hope in our world.

For those seeking to take practical steps to offer hope, the <u>CAFOD Advent Appeal</u> offers the chance to make a real difference where people need it the most. Those wishing to do something closer to home may want to think about how we encourage one another to demonstrate resilience and endurance when things are difficult, rather than resorting to self-pity or complaint. And for those who are just seeking to escape the hype of the build up to Christmas, Advent is a good time to return to Church and reconnect with the source of all hope, God Our Father. However you choose to spend Advent, I wish you every blessing. Stay hopeful!
